No Action Alert this Week.

News of the Last Week (# 7)

HB 226 Air Quality Revisions, the bill to allow Utah to adopt standards “different” from those of the EPA passed! This took several years and hard work by Rep. Edwards, Sen. Davis and air quality advocates, and it may turn out to be the signature air quality advancement of the Session.

HB 396 (Dee) Solid Fuel Burning was amended, and then passed. While the new version is a significant improvement, advocates will be calling on the Governor to veto the bill as an intrusion upon executive power by the Legislature.

HB 407 Scenic Byway Amendments (Noel), which was amended to require approval of the legislative body of a local government and the Scenic Byway committee before billboards can be built along a state or national Scenic Byway or All-American Road, nonetheless failed to pass!

HB 323 – Resource Management Planning, which we opposed due to its role in the lands grab portfolio of bills, passed. At least it will provide another set of opportunities statewide for citizens to weigh in on what the vision and planning objectives for Utah’s spectacular lands should be.

Budget News

Final budget actions on natural resources and environment were both positive and negative. The good news: \$1.5 million was appropriated for dredging the marina at Great Salt Lake State Park, \$1.2 million will go half-way to replacing and upgrading significantly the Nature Center at Farmington Bay (Glovers Lane), a \$1.5 million

appropriation for water quality, and the previously reported \$500,000 for phragmites removal on the Great Salt Lake!

The bad news: the \$2 m. in on-going funds set aside for clean school buses (HB 49 – which originally requested \$20 m.) did not make the final budget cut. In the final hours, another \$500,000 was directed to Ryan Benson of Big Game Forever to lobby for wolf delisting. The total amount of state funds spent on wolves, sage grouse, RS 2477 roads, state’s rights litigation, and land grab-related actions topped \$12 million!

The worst news: the Water Infrastructure Fund (SB 281-Adams) passed, and \$5 million in one-time General Funds seeded this restricted account for development of the Lake Powell pipeline and the Bear River dams/diversions.

What’s Ahead

Interim Study meetings begin May 20 and will be held on the 3rd Wednesday of each month (other than August and December). The Master Study Resolution – HJR 26 – includes several interesting and important issues that may be studied during the off-season: enacting a state NEPA law, Colorado River management strategies, replacing property taxes for water with higher water rates, reviving the income tax check off for non-game wildlife, air quality initiatives, and considering the importance of the public trust in water rights determinations (Water Development Commission).
