ACTION ALERT!

Take Action to keep tractor-trailers off Legacy Parkway for another 5 years. HB 339 would do that – it's in committee Monday 2/25 at 4 PM in #H30. Leave a message of support for HB 39 for Reps. Kyle Anderson, Marsha Judkins, and Merrill Nelson at 801.538.1029.

SB 52 - Secondary Water Metering Requirements-should be up for a Senate vote Monday or Tuesday. Contact Senators and urge them to support this critical water saving measure and the money that goes with it.

SB 144 - to set a baseline for measuring the impacts of the Inland Port, will also get a vote in the Senate early this week. Let Senators know this is important!

Call the Governor's office at 801.538.100 and urge him to veto HB 220!

News of the Fourth Week (Week # 4)

The worst news of the week was the passage of HB 220, lowering the bar for Energy Solutions to landfill hotter waste (Depleted Uranium and potentially “blended” B & C radioactive wastes). DU should be disposed of in a deep geologic repository like WIPP, not 10’ deep at ES.

More encouraging is the newly numbered and in play HJR 23, which would rescind the premature approval by the Legislature of the Class V hazardous waste landfill on the shores of Great Salt Lake at Promontory Point. Enactment of this resolution is a top priority!

HB 320, the anti-local control measure to stop local government efforts to reduce packaging waste, will be voted on in the House Transportation Committee Monday. Rep. Briscoe has a new bill (HB 377) to cut water waste on the green carpeted Capitol Hill.

Budget News

Updated revenue projections were released Friday. The new estimates are some \$150 million less than the fall projections but still about \$1 billion in new (“surplus”) money. As the Legislature accelerates to the Session’s end, how this gets spent will be the major focus of work by the Executive Appropriations Committee.

Proposals for tax cuts and sales tax “reform” will debut this week – really this time! Budgeting will be complicated by

this effort to broadening the sales tax base by taxing services, and there may be new pressure to cut income taxes now that folks are getting smaller refunds than expected from Trump’s federal tax cuts.

The appropriations requests we support - \$20 m. for secondary water metering loans and grants; \$500,000 in on-going funding for phragmites eradication, \$500,000 for Great Salt Lake research, and \$400,000 for water banking study and a pilot program - were well-received and ranked fairly high by the NRAE Appropriations Committee. We will lobby Executive Appropriations to get these items included in the final budget bills. Stay tuned!

Unfortunately, funding requests for renewing the \$2.5 m. contract for work on “wolf delisting”, \$1 m. for RS 2477 lawsuits, and \$300,000 for anti-public lands work (FIRM) were given high enough priority rankings to still be in play.

Over 35 Legislators who belong to the Clean Air Caucus described their funding requests for air quality improvements on Friday. It’s the most aggressive agenda ever to clear the air. Governor Herbert has staked out \$100 m. air quality initiatives. We’ll work with our allies to hold all to this pledge.
