ACTION ALERT!

No Action Alert this week.

Unfortunately, Monday Governor Herbert allowed HB 220 – Radioactive Waste Amendments (aka the Energy Solutions' bill) to become law without his signature. Thank you to all who called and messaged the Governor's Office urging a veto.

News of the Final Week (Week # 7)

Our top priority water bill, SB 52 - Secondary Water Metering Requirements - passed the House, capping a good year of resolving issues and progress on water law.

The two competing landfill bills - HJR 23 to rescind the previous legislative approval of the Promontory Point landfill, and SB 266 which would have allowed the dump to upgrade to a Class V and accept out-of-state hazardous wastes – failed. So the status quo continues for now.

HB 433, expanding the Utah Inland Port to rural “hubs” passed, as expected. So did SB 248, which directs that \$53 m. in mineral lease royalties be spent on a coastal bulk commodities shipping terminal. SB 268 authorized \$33 m. in bonds for transportation related to the Inland Port (and \$13 m. for a transit hub at the mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon). The IP Authority also received \$500k in one-time General Fund (GF) monies. The one I Port bill we supported, SB 144 - Environmental Monitoring, passed both House and Senate in the final week and was fully funded.

Budget News

The big budget news of the Session surrounded the collapse of the sales tax reform effort (HB 441), which will be carried forward over the next several months by a legislative task force of 10 members (per HB 495), and perhaps resolved in fall Special Session. In order to keep the pressure

on themselves to complete the task, legislative leadership withheld spending \$300 million of the \$1 billion budget surplus, which meant many worthy requests were not funded. These may be added back later, but we’ll see.

Final budget actions approved: \$100,000 in 1-time GF plus \$400,000 1-time in Sovereign Lands Restricted Account (SLRA) funds for Great Salt Lake research; \$5 m. to match \$50 m. in federal funds for Bonneville Salt Flats restoration; \$500,000 in on-going SLRA funds for phragmites eradication; \$400,000 for water banking study and pilot program; \$3 m. 1-time for the LeRay McAllister (critical lands) Fund; \$100,000 for Jordan River corridor preservation; \$200,000 for harmful algal bloom response; and \$5.5 m. 1-time (SLRA) for improvements at Antelope Island State Park.

In the continuing erosion of the SLRA, \$1.3 million was siphoned off for use of the inaptly-named Stewardship of Public Lands Commission. In other Sagebrush Rebellion 3.0 misdirection of public funds, another \$2 m. in GF went to Big Game Forever’s “wolf delisting” efforts (?), while \$1 m. was spent to reimburse Kane County for its R.S. 2477 litigation costs.

Though short of the Governor’s request for a \$100 m. investment, air quality initiatives were awarded \$28.8 – so a big year of progress toward cleaning up our airshed.

What’s Ahead

Interim Committees will begin meeting in May. May 14 is the normal effective date for bills passed and the first day a legislator may open a new bill request file for 2020.
