## Seven GSLA Birders Escape to Morro Bay Festival

Field trip and class opportunities were varied—van or carpooling trips around Morro Bay, more distant shore/cliff areas, and inland sites; boating or kayaking on the Bay. Even pelagic trips were available, but none of us attempted those. We registered independently so enjoyed the classes or field trips of our choosing, but stayed in same motel to facilitate transportation (3 cars

We had the great good fortune to study Greater and Lesser Scaup side-by-side on Mayor Pond in Brigham City. The Great Scaup was a lifer for two of us. Also enjoyed good views of Barrow's Goldeneye and a Wilson's Snipe among other waterfowl present.

En route home we picked up a Bald Eagle and Ring-necked Pheasant at Willard Bay plus other more routinely seen species. We were home by 4 p.m. with a list of 39 species, many of them special winter visitors in Utah! Join us on the 3rd Wednesday of every month for another Hotspot adventure!

## President's Report

Change is a natural part of life; it occurs in the life of every individual and in the life of every organization. In recent months, Great Salt Lake Audubon (GSLA) has experienced several changes. The most recent change is that GSLA is spinning off the Great Salt Lakekeeper program, and that Jeff Salt has stepped down as executive director of GSLA to become the full time Great Salt Lakekeeper. Though we will miss him, this is an exciting opportunity for Jeff and we offer our full support for this endeavor.

Nearly three years ago, Great Salt Lake Audubon began the Great Salt Lakekeeper program. The Lakekeeper program was established by GSLA to bring greater awareness to the Jordan River and the Great Salt Lake, to educate people about the importance and value of healthy, natural waterways, to establish a proscriptive community stewardship model, and to improve advocacy efforts for rivers, streams, and lakes. In essence, the program was designed to dramatically change the way Utahns respect water and natural resources.

In many ways the program has been a great success. People in the community, including governmental agencies, community leaders, and other nonprofits recognize and respect the Lakekeeper program. The program has effectively taught thousands of school children about the importance of water quality and about environmental stewardship. The Lakekeeper has also taken an active role in advocacy to protect birds, wildlife and their habitats.

While the program has been a success, there is so much more to be done. With this in mind, GSLA has decided to spin off the Great Salt Lakekeeper program. During the next few months, GSLA will continue to support the program until it can become fully operational as a separate 501(c)(3). In the process Jeff Salt has left Great Salt Lake Audubon as the Executive Director so that he may devote more time and energy to developing the Great Salt Lakekeeper program.

This decision is another in a series of changes for GSLA and for Jeff. Nearly five years ago, Jeff became

the first contract employee of GSLA, and was given the task of implementing a large, multi-year grant for environmental education. In addition to these duties, Jeff volunteered countless hours and continued to take on more and more responsibility, eventually earning him the title of executive director. During his tenure, Jeff stretched the organization and provided greater visibility and awareness of GSLA in the community. Some of Jeff's notable contributions to GSLA include the development of the Great Salt Lakekeeper program, an improved newsletter, and establishment of our annual gala fundraiser. Jeff has also been a strong environmental advocate.

Someone once said, "It's not what changes, it's what change is." It seems then that change is something that happens all the time. Examples for GSLA include hiring staff, writing grants, employing an executive director, hosting an annual gala, and spinning off the Lakekeeper program. This most recent change won't completely happen overnight, but will be a process. And that's the way it often is with change. The future is bright for GSLA, and we too are looking forward to many exciting opportunities and changes. In addition, if you're looking for a change, there are plenty of opportunities for you to become involved in your local Audubon chapter. And don't forget that spring (another change) is almost here. Happy birding.

## January Field Trip Species

There were some surprises. See if you can spot them.

On January 1 during the Jordan River Christmas Bird Count 65 species were seen. Highlights included Bald Eagle, Golden Eagle, Cooper's Hawk, Rough-legged Hawk, Peregrine Falcon, Prairie Falcon, Merlin, Wilson's Snipe, Barn Owl, Great Horned Owl, Lewis's Woodpecker and Northern Flicker (Yellow-shafted).

On January 14 at Wheeler Farm 17 species were seen. Highlights included Wood Duck and Western Screech Owl.

On January 28 at Farmington Bay 37 species were seen. Highlights include Tundra Swan, Common Goldeneye, Black-crowned Night-Heron, Bald Eagle, Greater Yellowlegs, Barn Owl, American Tree-Sparrow, and Yellow-headed Blackbird.

On January 31 during the Hawkwatch Raptor day 24 species were seen. Highlights include Bald Eagle, Golden Eagle, Northern Harrier, Red-tailed Hawk, Ferruginous Hawk, Rough-legged hawk, American Kestrel, Merlin, Prairie Falcon, and Barn Owl.

**March 16, 2004**

**Debbie Goodman, Audubon Council Lobbyist**

*Environmental Politicking Utah Style*

Debbie is the lobbyist for the Utah Audubon Council, which represents the 4 Audubon chapters in Utah. Debbie also represents Audubon Council interests on the Utah Wolf Management Plan Working Group, Utah Comprehensive Wildlife Conservation Plan Group (writing a state-wide sensitive species conservation plan), and on the Great Salt Lake Interpretive Trust (a non-profit organization trying to construct a Great Salt Lake Nature Center at Farmington Bay).

Debbie will discuss how the legislative process works, the political challenges that face environmental advocates, and strategies to surmount those obstacles. We'll also hear an insider's perspective on how the Utah governor's race is creating an opportunity to influence the environmental platform of the many candidates.

**April 20, 2004**

**Bob Brister, Outreach Coordinator  
for Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance**

*Wild Utah: America's Redrock Wilderness.*

The presentation is a multi-media slide show documenting citizen efforts to designate public lands in southern Utah's spectacular canyon country as Wilderness under the 1964 Wilderness Act. This 20-minute journey through red rock splendor invigorates and motivates viewers to participate in the movement to protect these unique lands.

"Wild Utah: America's Redrock Wilderness" was made possible through the generous donation of photos, music and words from concerned Utahns who wish to pass this heritage onto future generations, including a special reading by Pulitzer Prize winning author Wallace Stegner from his famous Wilderness Letter.

Bob will also spend 30-minutes reviewing the current status of Utah wilderness. This inspirational and informational event is a must see for citizens wishing to become personally involved to make a difference in this tremendous American public lands conservation effort.

We plan to plant 6,000 seedlings this spring, so we would love to have all the help that we can get from the Audubon folk! We will have plantings pretty much every Saturday morning once the weather breaks.

The week of March 22-26, we have scheduled 2 University Spring Breakaway programs that will be here, this means that we will be out on the site doing projects everyday that week, weather permitting. On March 27 I have scheduled an Eagle Scout Project from 9 to noon. Saturday April 3, we will have our annual moonlight planting/celebration from 7-10 p.m. This is when the students from the University of Utah Global Environmental Issues Class come out and play "Ode to Joy" on their harmonica's to the plants. This is followed by poetry readings and folk singing.

[Editor's Note: the following background information was taken from the TreeUtah web site.] One of TreeUtah's long-term projects along the Jordan River has been with the Great Salt Lake Audubon Society. The purpose of the Audubon/TreeUtah project is to restore and preserve migratory bird habitat along the Jordan River corridor. The restoration plan is designed to improve habitat for a broad variety of bird species through manipulation of site hydrology, control of exotic vegetation (e.g., Russian Olive and Tamarisk), and re-establishment of native trees and shrubs.

The site is located on the east side of the Jordan between 98th and about 111th South. The site encompasses approximately 120 acres of land. TreeUtah began planting on this visionary project in November 1998. Since then we have organized over 19,000 hours of

volunteer service to plant and care for just over 26,600 native tree and shrub seedlings on the Audubon/TreeUtah Migratory Bird Habitat Restoration Project.

To subscribe, send an e-mail to [GreatSaltLakeAudubon-subscribe@yahoogroups.com](mailto:GreatSaltLakeAudubon-subscribe@yahoogroups.com). You'll get an e-mail back that you must respond to within 21 days of receipt. This e-mail confirmation of your request to join Great Salt Lake Audubon's e-mail gives you two options. First, you can click on a link for the Yahoo Groups site for Great Salt Lake Audubon. Next click on the button to 'Join the Mailing List.' Then click on the Continue button and you will be subscribed. You can then close out of the Congratulations window whenever you are ready. Or you can also reply to the e-mail confirmation message.

If you are worried about receiving too much e-mail, don't worry. We've set up the group so that all messages are approved before being sent to the group. Our purpose is e-mail notification of chapter events for our members. Subscribe today!

## Great Salt Lake Bird Festival

There is a lot of excitement for this year's 6th Annual Great Salt Lake Bird Festival scheduled for May 14-22. This annual event spotlights the birds of Great Salt Lake and the surrounding areas. The Festival features bus/van/car/boat tours to birding areas, workshops with expert speakers, artists, displays, booths and food. The annual Festival dinner will be Dutch oven this year and the keynote speaker is John Acorn, "The Nature Nut" of Canadian Discovery Channel, Animal Planet and National Geographic. This is his first speak-

ing trip to Utah so we are really excited to have him speak. He will also have programs for students, their parents, and a Nature Walk to the Great Salt Lake Shorelands Preserve.

Bus and van tours are scheduled to Antelope Island State Park, and our special 'Behind the Gates' tours to Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge, Gillmor Sanctuary, Inland Sea Shorebird Reserve, Farmington Bay, and Ambassador Duck Club. ## Bird Paintings to Raise Funds

I paint with a focus on presenting birds in all of their beauty in a contemporary, painterly manner. I have been learning to use the complicated technique of egg tem-

pera, exploring methods not normally used with this more traditional medium.

My paintings have been accepted twice in the international exhibition Birds in Art 1998 and 2002.
