The photographs focus on the sandhill crane's natural history and their habitats, but also points towards the role the species plays in conservation, sometimes for its own sake, sometimes for the sake of others. The ultimate hope for the book is that it will educate and inspire, relating in pictures and words the true value of these birds, and encourage crane and wetland conservation worldwide. ## Board Meeting Highlights

The August 2004 Board meeting included an update on the annual birdseed sale and discussion of options to support Audubon Adventure kits in the public schools. Jen Hajj, chair of the Education committee, proposed several options for support of Audubon Adventures and the Board agreed to the following proposal. GSLA will develop a Utah Core curriculum key for Audubon Adventures and offer teacher workshops. GSLA will provide Audubon Adventure classroom presentation kits at no fee to participating teachers, with a total of 130 teachers receiving kits. GSLA will also offer classroom presentations in participating classrooms for \$60 and a Kids Corner at GSLA membership meetings at no charge. This encourages teachers and kids to attend our meetings.

The July 2004 Board meeting was a potluck dinner. During the business meeting, the finance committee proposed putting \$50,000.00 in an endowment fund with the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, so that we can tap it to manage the properties we own. Board approval was granted to the finance committee to proceed with investigation of various fund set-up options and other partners for the fund.

The group will be meeting at the Nevada Tourism Center in Wendover at 8 am on Saturday. The drive to the trailhead is approximately 3 hours from Salt Lake City. Once at the trailhead, the hike is 2.5 miles with an 1800 foot elevation gain. The hike should take 1.5 to 3 hours depending on your physical condition and any birding you do along the way. Most people in good physical condition will be able to do it in 2.5 hours at leisurely pace. There is no water so bring your own. Weather conditions can be variable, so dress accordingly. Suggested items: hat, sunscreen, sunglasses, windshell, warm clothes, gloves, binoculars, camera, food, and plenty of water. There are several ways to do this trip. You can overnight in Wendover either camping or moteling before or afterwards or you can make it a one-day trip. This is a little late in the migration, but, with luck, we should be able to see plenty of raptors close-up, such as Cooper's Hawk, Sharp-shinned Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk, and Golden Eagle. # President's Column

I believe the saying goes: location, location, and location. As it turns out, what is true in real estate and in business is also true for wildlife. Species prefer certain habitats, and if you really want to see a particular species of bird, you should seek out that bird's preferred habitat. And while I have seen a ruby-crowned kinglet on the salt flats of the Great Salt Lake during spring migration, I typically expect to find kinglets in conifers, especially in montane areas. Likewise, I do not expect to see blue-gray gnatcatchers at the top of Big Cottonwood canyon, but rather in pinyon-juniper, oak, or chaparral habitats.

It's kind of neat learning about habitats, and often times the habitat you are in provides clues about a

species in question. For instance, some species like the Empidonax flycatchers (which look very similar) are often best identified by habitat or voice, so it can be useful to know that the gray flycatcher prefers sagebrush or pinyon-juniper, whereas the willow flycatcher prefers wet riparian areas often dominated by willows. Sometimes, you can find a bird 'out of place' like in the example of the kinglet above, but generally, birds stick to those habitats they prefer.

While knowing about different habitats can make you a better birder—or provide some interesting trivia to impress your friends—this information can assist biologists, conservation groups, and even amateur birders in identifying areas that are of critical importance to the preservation of avian species. Back in the seventies, Audubon took an interest in the American white pelican and was instrumental in protecting Gunnison Island on the Great Salt Lake. As a result Gunnison Island is one of only a handful of nesting colonies in the United States. Seabirds are another prime example. Albatross for instance, forage across thousands and thousands of square miles of open ocean, but they nest on only a few small islands. Without the islands the birds cannot reproduce, and without fresh faces, the population would crash, so those islands are vital for the bird's survival.

Stopover sites (places where birds rest during migration) are also vital for many birds. The submerged

sandbars of the Platte River in Nebraska provide roosting habitat for sandhill cranes during their annual spring migration. They use this area to build up fat reserves that will get them through migration and give them a good start on nesting. For an example closer to home, up to a million eared grebes rely on the Great Salt Lake for refuge and sustenance each fall as they go through a feather molt and become flightless for a month.

These examples show that habitat is important, and Great Salt Lake Audubon is working to protect, restore, and enhance habitats for birds and other wildlife. One way we do this is by creating awareness: awareness about these magnificent creatures, about their needs, about threats, and about opportunities to do something beneficial for them. I encourage you to find ways to get involved. It might be attending a birding class or a general membership meeting, or going on a field trip. I also encourage you to consider coming to our fundraiser on November 13 as we have scheduled an exciting, entertaining, and educational program that you won't want to miss (see inside for more details).

## Audubon Lobbyist Update

Wolf Working Group Progress. You may have read the recent articles in the Tribune or Standard Examiner about the lack of progress in the Wolf Working Group after 7 months of meetings. On a more upbeat note, we did actually reach a major milestone at our last meeting on July 27. We have divided into six sub-groups to begin drafting the major sections of the management plan, and Bill Fenimore and I are each serving on two of these groups. Review of these draft sections begins in late August, and we are hoping to have a rough overview ready for the interim legislative meeting in November.

Proposal for Reduced ATV Use in Waterfowl Management Areas. The following passage is quoted from the July-Aug RAC Meeting preparation materials I received from DWR. "The DWR is proposing a change in ATV regulations on state Waterfowl Management Areas. The proposal is to eliminate ATV use on these areas unless posted open. Currently, ATV's are allowed in areas open to airboats within WMA boundaries. With Great Salt Lake levels near record low levels, ATV use and access has expanded dramatically and visible damage is occurring in many areas, particularly along the south shore and Layton marsh areas within the Farmington Bay Management Area." The proposed change was recommended to the RACs and the Wildlife Board on August 12 and it passed. This makes regula-

tions consistent between sovereign lands, WMAs, and state parks.

Last, I have been appointed to a four-year term on the DWR Habitat Council, replacing Jack Rensel of Audubon, who has served for many years and with much wisdom as the non-game representative to the Council. No one can replace Jack, but I look forward to serving and plan to call him with all my dumb questions in coming years.
