Watching Sandhill Cranes on Nebraska's Platte River

A group of Great Salt Lake Auduboners spent four days in Kearney, Nebraska during March enjoying the spectacle of 500,000 Sandhill Cranes on their spring migration. At dawn and dusk at the Rowe Audubon

Sanctuary we viewed the cranes from blinds near their Platte River roosting areas and during the day we saw the cranes feeding and dancing in the nearby fields. The sound and sight of these magnificent birds was thrilling. The cranes typically spend three weeks here putting on fat to fuel their continued migration northwards. They actually breed and raise young in northern U.S. and Canada. The Rowe Sanctuary has a new Visitors Center

where we were able to see many birds at the feeders. These included **American Goldfinch**, **American Tree Sparrow**, **White-breasted Nuthatch** and **Harris's Sparrow**, a lifer for many of us. Another highlight of an early morning drive was a chance to see **Greater Prairie-Chickens** strutting their stuff on a lek.

Because our organized trips occurred in the early morning and late afternoon we all had time during the middle of the day to investigate other attractions of the area. We visited nearby wetlands and saw many waterbirds. Some of us visited historical sites near Kearney.

Other birds seen were: Snow Goose, Canada Goose, American Wigeon, Mallard, Blue-winged Teal, Northern Shoveller, Northern Pintail, Green-winged Teal, Bufflehead, Ring-necked Pheasant, Wild Turkey, Northern Harrier, Red-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel, Killdeer, Greater Yellowlegs, Baird's Sandpiper, Mourning Dove, Belted Kingfisher, Northern Flicker, Eastern Phoebe, American Robin, White-crowned Sparrow, Dark-eyed Junco, Northern Cardinal, Red-winged Blackbird, Western Meadowlark, House Finch, American Goldfinch and House Sparrow.

Now is the time to sign up for fantastic birding trips in northern Utah. The 7th Annual Great Salt Lake Bird Festival offers guided field trips to many 'Behind the

Gates' birding and wildlife sites around Great Salt Lake. A variety of trips, including bus, van, kayak and horseback are scheduled May 12-17.

Tour Antelope Island State Park with guides Don Paul, Great Salt Lake biologist, Genevieve Atwood, former state geologist, John Bellmon, former National Audubon board member and Festival Keynote speaker Al Batt. Take a bus to Jordanelle and Heber Valley areas to experience 'mist-netting' of birds. Go 'Behind the Gates' at Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge, Great Salt Lake's south shore, and Ambassador Duck Club.

In addition to the daily field trips, the Festival offers workshops, live animals, optic vendors, booths, artists, food and several youth activities on Friday, May 13 and Saturday, May 14 at the Davis County FairPark in Farmington. Workshop topics include Building a Backyard Pond, Birds & Blooms bird friendly plants, Photography, Water Fowl, and Raptor Identification. Hawkwatch International, Tracy Aviary and Utah Wildlife Rehabilitation will have presentations featuring live animals.

Saturday, May 14 is a great time to bring the family to Great Salt Lake Bird Festival. Home Depot-Centerville is sponsoring a Make and Take Bird House Craft. Wildlife Resources and the Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge have some great interactive displays as well as crafts for youth. The Festival also offers two "Those Wild Wetlands" classes that cover Cub, Boy & Girls Scout badge requirements.

As a special treat for people in Utah, Great Salt Lake Bird Festival is bringing in a special keynote speaker, Al Batt. Al is a radio and TV personality, storyteller, speaker, humorist and Birder from Minnesota. His presentation is titled: "Bird Stories." Al will be speaking at the popular Dutch oven dinner, Saturday, May 14 at 6 pm.

Board Meeting Highlights

In March, the board approved a motion to set up and maintain a checking account for the Audubon Council of Utah; however, a similar motion for UBET was not approved. The board approved a motion to advertise in the ReDirect Guide (a green pages). Sufficient funds remain in the Program Committee budget to host a potluck at the May 17 general meeting. Rumors over a Salt Lake County proposal to convert wetlands to soccer fields were discussed and all agreed that GSLA should follow up and provide comments. Other topics included Legacy Highway, Earth Day T-shirts, and the upcoming gala. The board also agreed to try a spring fund-raising letter.

In April, the board approved donating \$100 to support the care of owls (non-releasable, teaching birds) that have been displayed at several events. Funding for a scout project was not approved. Updates were provided on Legacy Highway, Basin & Range, the annual gala, the NAWCA grant, Cottonwood wetlands and restoration activities on the Jordan River site. The budget for the next fiscal year was discussed, and will be approved at the May meeting. The ad-hoc committee on staff presented an update and hopes to have the position filled by mid-April.
