## 1,2,3's on Utah's IBAs, BHCAs

The following provides a very brief update on Utah's Important Bird Areas (IBAs) Program as well as information on Utah's Intermountain West Joint Venture (IWJV) Bird Habitat Conservation Areas (BHCAs).

The Important Bird Area program is an international, national and statewide effort to identify, monitor and conserve important habitat for birds. The Utah Important Bird Area Program has broadly announced 15 sites. The Wellsville Mountain Raptor Migration Area in Cache and Box Elder Counties as well as the San Juan County - Gunnison Sage Grouse are also IBAs. Help in nominating additional IBAs would be greatly appreciated. (See [www.audubon.org/bird/iba/utah](http://www.audubon.org/bird/iba/utah) for details.)

The 17 IBA sites comprise over 2.5% of Utah's land mass. IBA nominations generally meet fairly rigorous criteria based upon bird survey data. Currently in Utah, landowners and/or land managers must give their approval for a site to become an IBA. The five major bays of Great Salt Lake have been nominated as global IBAs. The Gunnison Sage Grouse IBA has also been nominated as a global IBA.

The Intermountain West Joint Venture is an implementation component of the North American Waterfowl Management Plan. The IWJV works to identify, protect, restore and enhance wetlands and other important habitats for waterfowl and other birds. The Utah all-bird plan for the IWJV includes 56 BHCAs. (Go to Plans then Utah on the [www.iwjk.org](http://www.iwjk.org) website.)

The BHCAs were determined by experts in the various regions of the state and agreed upon by the Utah State IWJV Steering Committee. The 56 BHCAs include over 10% of Utah's land mass. Each of the BHCAs list priority birds and habitats as well as threats and opportunities.

These two efforts provide a valuable perspective on where the most important habitat for birds is within the State of Utah and the proactive work to conserve these areas. For more information, contact me at [wmartinson@audubon.org](mailto:wmartinson@audubon.org).

## President's Column

Birds are great! No matter where I go, I can find at least a few of my feathered friends. And not only are there birds, but also bird watchers and bird enthusiasts. attempt to influence legislation and policies that affect birds, wildlife and habitats. In other words, we're doing a lot.

But we couldn't do it without your support, so thank you. I encourage you to find avenues (whether it's with your voice, your time, or your financial giving) to participate in environmental conservation, either with GSLA or another organization. Of course, we welcome volunteers and there are a number of interesting opportunities available. I also encourage you to grab your binoculars and get out and go birding with us sometime soon...you'll meet some great people and you may even see a few of my close, personal, feathered friends.

## Farmington Bay Naturalist Program Needs Volunteers

Could you donate a few hours each month to help children and wildlife in a beautiful outdoor setting on the shores of the Great Salt Lake? If so, the Farmington Bay Naturalist Program needs your help. No experience is necessary, and training will be provided on site on Saturday, September 17.

The Great Salt Lake Learning Center at Farmington Bay offers hands-on wetlands education field trips to school groups of all ages, and currently serves 3,000 children annually. Requests for field trips greatly exceed the current volunteer staff capacity, so the Learning Center is recruiting new Naturalists.

The Learning Center is a community partnership involving the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources, the Davis School District Foundation, and a non-profit parent organization (the Great Salt Lake Interpretive

## Board Meeting Highlights

Many of the same topics were discussed in both the July and August board meetings; therefore, the following summary combines highlights from both months. GSLA received a check from Draper City in the amount of \$3016 for wetland restoration on our conservation easement. The board approved proposals to adopt a stretch of Interstate 80 between milepost 110 and 112 (~7200 West) and another to have T-shirts made with the GSLA logo. The adopt-a-highway program will provide publicity, and the T-shirts will be sold at the upcoming Gala and other events. Kent Lewis was appointed to the board. Details for the gala were discussed. The board expressed interest in land ownership and conservation easements in Tooele County near the Great Salt Lake. A candidate for the Audubon Council of Utah policy advocate position was discussed, and some ideas were presented on how to use Collaborative Funding from National Audubon for the chapter.

Most people in good physical condition will be able to do it in 2.5 hours at a leisurely pace. There is no water source so bring your own. Weather conditions can be variable, so please dress accordingly. Suggested items: hat, sunscreen, sunglasses, windshell, warm clothes, gloves, binoculars, camera, food, & plenty of water. **The group will be meeting at the Nevada Tourism Center in Wendover at 8 am on Sat.** There are several ways to do this trip. ## Update from Restoration Site

By now most of you have probably heard that Keith Johnson was injured on June 15 while working on the GSLA Restoration Project. In a freak accident, 5 horses stampeded through a gate. Keith was standing nearby and was knocked down and stepped on, breaking his femur and elbow. He is now home and slowly healing. He hopes to be up and around in the next few weeks.

After a very successful planting season this spring the total number of seedlings that have been planted on the Audubon/TreeUtah Restoration Site is over 38,000. The acreage that TreeUtah is taking care of is around 50 acres. This has made it necessary to double our agricul-

tural irrigation system. We now run five pumps simultaneously to pour out over 250 gallons per minute to the site. When all five pumps are running we are watering over an acre of land.

John Rice and Michael Weland at URMCC are continuing to work with South Jordan City to develop a restoration plan for the plants they bulldozed earlier this year. The work will begin either late fall or early spring.

## Mount Nebo Field Trip Notes

On Saturday, July 30 a group of eight people managed to make the early 6 am start to the Mount Nebo Scenic Loop, a first time visit for the Great Salt Lake Audubon. Following the instructions of our leader Bob Huntington, we drove directly to an area about 5 miles below the Summit where we were treated to a flock of Purple Martins feeding with their young and conveniently perching on dead branches to give us excellent looks. Within an hour we added 14 species to our list. This included wonderful views of a house wren in a nest cavity, many mountain bluebirds, western tanagers and after much discussion, immature juncos. We continued birding to the summit and had lunch at "The Devils Kitchen" a beautiful area that rivals Bryce Canyon (honest!). As we made our way back down the canyon, we compiled a list of a total 34 species seen and one audible, a song sparrow we just couldn't manage to see. We ended the day of great birding and spectacular scenery with a stop at a local Payson drive-inn for an ice cream treat before making our way back to Salt Lake. Participants included Bob Huntington our leader, Jim and Susan Ogilvie, Dave Hanscom, Karen Marshall, Geoff Hardie, Travis Young and Kathy Coleman.
