CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

On Christmas Day in 1900 a small group of conservationists led by scientist and writer, Frank Chapman, changed the course of ornithological history. They posed an alternative to the "side hunt," a Christmas day activity in which teams competed to see who could shoot the most birds and small mammals. Chapman proposed to identify, count and record all the birds they saw, founding what is now considered to be the world's most significant citizen-based conservation effort.

We invite birders of all skill levels to participate in Audubon's longest running wintertime tradition by joining us for the annual Salt Lake City Christmas Bird Count to be held Saturday, December 15, 2007. Not only is this a fun activity, but it yields important data that help Audubon develop a State of the Birds report and prioritize bird conservation activities.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It's hard to believe 2007 is almost over, but as we near the end of the year, I want to wish you a happy holiday season. Thanksgiving is just around the corner and it's worth a little of our time to remember our many blessings and to be thankful

for what we have and what we've accomplished. In 2007 Great Salt Lake Audubon held its 25th annual Basin and Range field seminar as well as its sixth annual Gala. I'm thankful for all the volunteers who make our programs possible and to all of the generous donors who support us financially. I very much appreciate the support we received this year from the Patagonia Outlet Store and IHI Environmental.

In addition, we received a \$5,000 grant from the Salt Lake County Zoo, Arts and Parks Program, and we received almost \$1,400 from National Audubon to purchase plants and fencing material for our restoration projects, and GSLA passed its first ever financial audit. I'm grateful for the positive relationships GSLA has with other groups such as National Audubon Society, Friends of Great Salt Lake, and Utah Rivers Council.

We held eight programs over the last year and offered one or two birding field trips every week. We continue to support a number of Christmas Bird Counts, the Great Backyard Bird Count, Fish Springs National Wildlife Refuge, the Great Salt Lake Bird Festival, Bluebird Box Trail and the Brighton Bird Count. I'm grateful to all the volunteers and to the board of directors who donate their time, talent, and treasure to make the organization what it is.

Finally, I'd be remiss if I did not mention the Willow Creek re-alignment. We've been planning this aspect of the Jordan River Restoration Project for over four years, and our plans of creating additional riparian forest habitat finally became a reality this October. There is much to be thankful for, but we cannot sit on our laurels. Next year, there will be additional op-

portunities for the organization and for you to become involved. **We'll be looking for new board members, additional volunteers, more tree planters, a webmaster and others, so please consider giving us a hand.** Thank you, Nathan.

THE AUDUBON COUNCIL of UTAH VISITS the UINTA BASIN

Twice a year, the four Utah Audubon chapters get together to discuss conservation issues, share ideas and experiences, and make preparations for the upcoming legislative session. Great Salt Lake Audubon hosted the 2007 retreat in the Uinta Basin, which is the first time the Council has met in Vernal.

The group birded Dinosaur National Monument, Pelican Lake, and Ouray National Wildlife Refuge and reached a weekend list of 59 species, including tundra swan, sandhill crane and Eurasian-collared dove. We counted over 8,300 birds (mostly American coots) on Pelican Lake which will qualify this site as an Important Bird Area.

The colors and scenery were spectacular, especially at the Monument. Participants also visited the Utah

The actual planting should only take an hour (or two at most), but **we need volunteers to help us fence the plants, and depending on number of volunteers may undertake other tasks as well.** The weather may be cool, so dress accordingly. PROJECT FEEDERWATCH

Want a fun birding project for the winter? Being a FeederWatcher is easy and fun, and at the same time helps generate the world's largest database on feeder-bird populations, says project leader David Bonter. Since its start in 1987, nearly 40,000 people have submitted observations, adding up to well over 1.5 million checklists.

The 21st season of Project FeederWatch gets underway November 10 and runs through April 4. All ages and skill levels are welcome. To learn more about Project FeederWatch or to register, visit www.birds.cornell.edu/pfw or call the Lab toll-free at (800) 843-2473. In return for the \$15 fee (\$12 for Lab members) participants receive the FeederWatcher's Handbook, an identification poster of the most common feeder birds in their area, a calendar, complete instructions, and the FeederWatch annual report, Winter Bird Highlights.

2007 September and October Board Meeting Highlights

The last two Board meetings have been the most encouraging meetings I have attended. GSLA realized several positive results for the Board and Volunteer efforts during the last two months. Efforts in Finances, Restoration and Conservation all bore fruit.

Financially, the Gala was a big success (not to mention we all had a pleasurable experience). The grant request for ZAP funding was also awarded. The Board agreed to spend a little bit of the money to purchase a new computer and software that should provide you with a better Pelican. Our Treasurer, Kathy Waddell, also completed GSLA's 990 (our taxes).

The restoration project to realign Willow Creek finally began in the last two weeks. You need to visit the site to see the progress and extent of this effort. It has been almost four years in planning. Keith and other people associated with the project and all the Board members are excited to see the work begin. On the conservation front, the Board is officially supporting National and Colorado Audubon's petition to list the Gunnison Sage Grouse as an endangered species.

The GSLA board is actively monitoring the appeal by "Friends" of the GSL Minerals lease proposal. DNR is currently not responding to the issues addressed in the appeal. Currently they are questioning "Friends" standing in the process. The Board is somewhat surprised the public would not have standing on the disposition of public property. It will be interesting to see what transpires in the next two months for the GSLA and "Friends".
