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

### Looking to the Future

Planning is important for every facet of life and it's especially true for nonprofits such as GSLSA. By the time you receive this issue of The Pelican, the board will

have completed one round of a strategic planning process where we examined the long-term goals of the organization. We'll try to tackle the challenges and opportunities of the future, including whether to hire staff and our role and responsibility for long-term management of the Jordan River properties.

There will be increased emphasis on communicating with our members and the public regarding our accomplishments and alerting you to important conservation topics. For example, GSLSA recently joined an effort requesting the state of Utah to revise the Mineral Leasing Plan for Great Salt Lake. That sounds simple enough, but it will be worthwhile for us to provide our members and the public with a brief background of the request and discuss why we believe it is important as well as offer potential opportunities for you to get involved (e.g., sending an e-mail or writing a letter).

I suspect the planning efforts will highlight the great contributions volunteers make to GSLSA as well as the need for additional help. This organization has been around for 95 years and isn't likely to go away anytime soon; however, for almost a century we have relied on the charity of people like yourself to provide time, talent, and treasure. Sure, we organize and lead field trips and host programs, but do you ever wonder if there is more? I encourage you to find ways to get involved in your local chapter, whether it's joining the board, helping a standing committee, or one-time activities like stuffing envelopes or loading sunflower seeds into cars. You count on us to be leaders in conservation and in turn we're counting on you as we continue our planning efforts. Thank you!



## Board Meeting Highlights January and February 2008

Three subjects dominated the discussions at the last two board meetings. First, the Board contemplated our organization's fulfillment of each practice in the Utah Nonprofit Association's (UNA) statement of ethics before unanimously agreeing we meet the requirements of an ethical non-profit organization. The Board also agreed to renew the GSLA's membership in the UNA.

The Board met February 16 at the Hawkwatch International offices for a strategic planning session. The Board separated GSLA's activities into seven major areas that Board members have teamed up to consider. We hired a facilitator and had a meaningful and productive afternoon.

The conservation issues associated with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) development plans for the Great Salt Lake are also being monitored and discussed by the Board. Currently we have signed on with "Friends" in letters requesting a review of DNR's Great Salt Lake management plan and whether current policy is consistent with those plans. We have also requested the opportunity to comment on the development plans themselves. DNR is currently stating that the public and GSLA don't have the right to comment on DNR's development plans. The issue appears to be heading towards a legal stand-off.

The issues are not trivial and the ecological consequences for the Great Salt Lake ecosystem are long term. GSLA is currently looking for someone to take the lead for our organization in these matters. Let a Board member know if you are interested.

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## January 1<sup>st</sup> Jordan River Bird Count Results *Leaders, Jeanne Le Ber and Ray Smith*

27 people, divided into 7 teams recorded 82 species and 14,912 individual birds. Last year we had 69 species, 26,398 individual birds. We added 6 new species and now have a total of 129 species seen since 1988 in the JR CBC 7-mile radius circle, centered at the coordinate of I-15 and the Salt Lake and Utah county border.

We do it again next year, reserve the date on your calendar - Thursday, January 1, 2009!!! Don't miss the fun and excitement.

## **Audubon Day at the Legislature???**

There is a push from the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (DWR) to increase a revenue stream into the agency from other sources than the traditional hunting and fishing license sales which are 96% of the DWR budget. The new annual Watchable Wildlife Pass (\$10.00) that will be charged at such locations like FBWMA that was passed in the 2007 session is one method.

An Audubon Day at the legislative session may be one avenue to bring attention to the need for DWR to recognize the importance of the "Watchers." Imagine Audubon partnering with Conservation Groups, like TNC, Friends of Great Salt Lake, et al., hosting an Audubon Day (or a Watcher Day) with a bird walk watching event on Eagle Day 2009 (or some such outing).

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## **Audubon Council of Utah**

The idea to have an "Audubon Day" has been well received by members of the Council. We will discuss this further at the Council meeting this Spring (weekend of April 26th near Zion NP).

The four Utah chapters of Audubon meet twice a year to discuss subjects of mutual concern and to prepare for the upcoming legislative session. All members are welcome and encouraged to attend.

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## **Alert from HEALUtah**

The Utah Radiation Control Board was the first state agency to take a stand against EnergySolutions' plan to import 20,000 tons of nuclear waste from Italy. Now you must make your voice heard, too. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) is taking public comments on EnergySolutions' request to import nuclear waste from Italy's defunct reactors. Send a message to the NRC that importing another country's nuclear waste sets a bad precedent for Utah and the U.S. to become the world's nuclear waste dump and endangers our health, safety, and security. ## Federal Duck Stamps – Why Birders Should Purchase Them Too!

Although called Duck Stamps the stamps actually go to the purchase of migratory bird habitat.

Beyond the purchase of National Wildlife Refuges, Congress in 1958 authorize acquisition of wetlands as WPAs. Thus began one of the most aggressive acquisition campaigns in history; a race against drainage tile and ditches.” Refuges now include wetlands and the important nesting uplands as well as tall grass prairies and even an Elk Refuge.

Since its inception the Federal Duck Stamp Program has purchased 5.2 million acres in the refuge system, an additional 36,000 Wildlife Production Areas (WPA's which average 90 acres each) and 2.5 Million acres in easements. Ninety eight percent of all dollars raised go directly to the purchase of habitat. Dollar for dollar this is considered the best value for protecting habitat.

When called by its official name - The Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamps – birders will understand its true value. Migratory Bird Stamps can be purchased at your local post office, USPS.com and www.Duckstamp.com. It's the best \$15 investment you can make!

## MOSQUITOFISH MONITORING AT FISH SPRING NWR

During 2007, eight volunteers collected data on the location of non-native mosquitofish at Fish Springs NWR. Data from this citizen science project showed that mosquitofish preferred warmer water which was either from thermal springs or ponds that warmed over the summer months. As the ponds warmed over the summer, mosquitofish moved further away from the warm springs and occupied more areas. Conversely, the fish were seen in fewer locations during the fall as water temperatures cooled. Information gleaned from this effort may allow the refuge manger to identify ponds where native fish might outcompete the non-native mosquitofish and may also reduce workload for refuge staff if certain fish screens (barriers to fish movement) do not need to be cleaned. In exchange for the volunteer efforts, we were allowed to bird areas of the refuge generally off limits to the public. We thank Jay Banta and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Refuge for allowing us this opportunity.
