BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

MARCH/APRIL 2009

Spring brings change to our environment and also to the Board of the GSLA. Several Board members will be stepping down in June and new Board members are being solicited by the organization. Prospective new Board members attended the last few Board meetings. Please support the candidates in this issue of the Pelican. The Board is still looking for a secretary to replace myself. If you or anyone related to the GSLA is interested in making a difference, please contact Heather or any current Board Member. Our Chapter is also searching for a new office, as the building where our current office is located, is due to be demolished shortly. If you know of any office space that might be amenable to us please contact any Board member.

Long-term management of the restoration project has been a major topic at the last two Board meetings. Our Executive Director has been working extensively with Keith and the Restoration Committee on a long term agreement with the USFWS that should be ratified soon. As stated earlier, it is spring and there is considerable work to be done that the Board and the Committee would like to get started. The Jordan River has also been the subject of deliberation for the conservation committee and the Executive Director. Bruce is performing admirably as GSLA's representative in the Envision Utah Jordan River planning process. The Conservation Committee agreed to sign with National Audubon on their comment letter that generally supported the State of Utah Division of Water Quality Jordan River Total Maximum Daily Load proposal.

The annual planning meeting will be on April 26 from 1:00 to 4:00 at the Hawk Watch offices. Any and all interested GSLA members are encouraged to participate. We have also tentatively scheduled a strategic planning meeting in September.

The conservation issues associated with the GSL Minerals expansion are still weighing heavily on the minds of Board members and we continue to work with the environmental community and regulatory authorities to protect the Great Salt Lake Ecosystem. Several recent actions by regulatory authorities and the judicial system have occurred in the last few months and since the last Board meetings. GSLA members should stay informed through the local media and web sites on these continuing developments. The Board will continue to monitor and comment on these issues.

BRUCE'S BLOG:

Potassium, Pelicans, Thomas Friedman

Aahhh, Spring! Birds chattering in blossoming trees, warm little breeze, flowers blooming, hope arising.

On a field trip to Kennecott's mitigation Inland Sea Shorebird Preserve, 3700 protected acres, we saw avocets, grebes, phalaropes, curlews. For us: recreation, reconnecting with nature, awareness and education; but, a home and survival for 120,000 birds and 100 species.

Great Salt Lake Minerals produces an economically important mineral, potassium sulfate, from GSL saline water in huge evaporation ponds. They want to expand the ponds and their canal to insure a constant flow of water to them. "Friends of GSL" says the net effect would be to drop the lake level to 4,188 feet, three feet lower than has ever been recorded since 1851, creating a land bridge to the White Pelican rookery on Gunnison Island, making it accessible to predators. (GSLA has joined them in trying to prevent this.)

In John Cavitt's study of the sharp decline in 27 species of GSL birds, all of them were down 30% or more, due primarily to nest predation. Using night cameras, they identified the worst culprit: Raccoons. (Who were imported to provide hunting for hounds.)

A recent lecture by Thomas Friedman, author of *Hot, Flat, and Crowded* (absolutely required reading). He talked about the convergence of global population increases, petro-dictators, the global increase in a consuming middle class, and a new "global weirding" climate era. We are in for some major economic and planetary changes, quite possibly irreversible. But, half the book is about what can be done, what we can do.

Snow's in the forecast for tomorrow. Still, I can't help but feel hopeful and optimistic.
