

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

My husband and I spend a great deal of time in the outdoors and when it came time for me to get more involved in the conservation community, Audubon was an obvious choice. Throughout my adult life I have been a member of Audubon, and have admired its commitment and rational approach to conservation.

I think many of you will laugh when I tell you I did not expect to end up as the next President of Great Salt Lake Audubon. During the Board meeting I was just about to raise my hand and say I would gladly sit on the Board and perhaps offer my assistance as the Vice-President when before I could do so, Ray Smith offered to take the VP position. I thought, "Hey, I was going to do that!" At any rate, here we are, and I'm very glad to have the opportunity and am looking forward to working with a tremendous Board and membership.

The organization is running fairly smoothly. Jen and the Board have done a wonderful job. Even so, it is a very logical time to begin a systematic review of what GSLA wants to accomplish in the next 3 to 5 years and make sure that we are adopting the proper tactics to accomplish our short, mid, and long-term goals and to that end we will be asking for the help and input of the committee chairs and membership.

A few things are clear priorities. First, building our membership base. Second, developing a long-term plan for the Jordan River Restoration Project, including the establishment of an endowment for its administration. Third, working more effectively with other conservation organizations to leverage our collective efforts.

These priorities are interdependent and offer significant opportunities for involvement at all levels. For example, in building our membership base one of the first things to get a handle on is identifying "a member of Audubon." I believe there is a largely untapped population of folks from 20 to 40 years old who have a lot of energy and commitment to conservation causes. Presenting them with a hands-on project like Jordan River Restoration may be just the thing to get them motivated to join us. Some of them may be members of other conservation organizations. Engaging this group is an essential part of planning for the long-term health and existence of GSLA. Attracting them will take some creative, "out of the box" thinking and possibly the use of new techniques of communication. Contained within this deceptively simple example are many, many small projects. As an actively practicing attorney and former project manager, I am used to breaking complicated projects into small "chunks." If you have a commitment to participate at any level, we welcome your suggestions and need your help! We are ready, willing and able to create a project that fits your time commitment as well as being fun.

In closing, I very much look forward to working with the Board and our membership to continue the great work of the GSLA. Farewell to Jen Hajj and appreciation for her dedication and hard work. The important task of filling the open officer and board member positions was finally done when these members stepped up to the plate and agreed to fill the volunteer positions: as President - Leslie Orgera (an attorney), as representative for GSLA to the Utah Audubon Council and Vice-President - Ray Smith, as Treasurer - Geoff Hardies (an accountant) and as Secretary - Nancy Bill (former English teacher). Bill Yates who volunteered to serve on the restoration committee and Jaimi Butler, Education Committee chair, have also volunteered as board members. All have been approved by the board.

Board meetings have been changed to the first Wednesday of each month in order for Geoff Hardies to serve as Treasurer. All members are welcome to attend. Contact an officer or board member for location and directions for upcoming meetings.

Updates from Bruce Heath: The new 5- year Cooperative Agreement for the Jordon River Restoration Project was signed by U.S. Fish and Wildlife. Sylvia Gray reported on the Gala. At present, 65 auction items have been donated but more are welcome. BRUCE'S BLOG: DESERET RANCH

At the last Utah Audubon Council Retreat, Bill Hopkin gave us a very interesting presentation on rotational cattle grazing as a conservation method on the LDS Church-owned Deseret Ranch in Rich County. Plus, I kept hearing glowing reports from birders who had been fortunate enough to go birding on the ranch, which is closed to the general public. So, when Mark Stackhouse opened up an extra birding trip there, I jumped at the chance. It turned out to be one of those amazing wonderful days you occasionally get in life!

The birding was great. The count for the group was over 120. An immature Red-naped Sapsucker fed on nectar from square drilled holes and drove away a competing and persistent hummingbird. Lots of little details about the differences between Empidonax flycatchers. Sage grouse hens. Masses of night-hawks. Juvenile plumage pelicans, proving that they nest there. Three kinds of terns. Studying the difference between our common White-faced Ibis and the much rarer (here) Glossy Ibis. Lots of peeps. Huge Sandhill Cranes, Great Blue Herons, and many many Golden Eagles. White-tailed Prairie Dogs all over the place, with perched Burrowing Owls. Great Horned Owl finale.

But, even more interesting is the way they rotate grazing to improve both the rangeland and the profit from cattle. The basic idea is to replicate the range conditions when bison roamed here, moved from place to place by predators, but now with cows and cowboys instead. They use about 100 fenced pastures for 3 huge cattle herds. Instead of leaving a herd of 45 cows in one area for 45 days (like BLM land) where they trample riparian habitat and munch succulent grass species to non-existence, they only keep the cows on a given pasture for 3-5 days each year, let them eat some of every type of vegetation, then move them. All of the grasses and vegetation quickly recover and within about two weeks the grazed area looks plush and contains a wide variety of plants and wildlife habitat and species.

There are always costs to preserving habitat. Every project, including our Jordan River Restoration project, has to be economically self-sustaining. Deseret Ranch does this without government help or donors by raising more cattle per acre, selling birding field trips, selling expensive hunting and fishing trips, and hosting paying guests in their new lodge. By preventing destruction from public access and ATVs and by using creative enlightened modern range management, they have allowed nature to create an almost pristine natural area which generates its own income.

It is so reassuring just knowing that this huge space is preserved indefinitely for so many birds. Because of it, our world is a better place.

COLD AND WET DOESN'T STOP THE BLUEBIRD BOX COUNT

Report by *Jeanne LeBer*

Many thanks to the folks who came out to check on the bluebird boxes in Strawberry Valley on June 12, 2010: Jeanne LeBer, Jim and Susan Ogilvie, Leslie Orgera, Emma, Kjell, Knute, and Sara Rife, Nancy Sakahara, Matt Smith, and Ray Smith.

While the weather was cold(45°F) and wet, we were fortunate not to have a lot of rain. Let's just say it was invigorating versus warm and sweaty.

We suspect that the late summer delayed the start of the nesting season in Strawberry Valley. Last Year we were one week earlier and had a number of chicks in the boxes. This Year – no chicks and no fledged young. The count was as follows:

Mountain Bluebird	-- 17 nests, 28 eggs
Tree Swallow	-- 25 nests, 34 eggs
House Wren	-- 16 nests, 16 eggs
Empty boxes	-- 31
Missing boxes	--4

After a morning spent checking the boxes, we enjoyed lunch in front of the pot-bellied stove at the visitor center. Many thanks to the Heber Ranger District for supporting our efforts. We have been doing this since 1987 and continue to see an impact with the numbers of Mountain Bluebirds in the area.

A CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS!!!

The Restoration Committee oversees properties owned or managed by GSLA. Our gem is the Great Salt Lake Audubon Jordan River Wildlife Refuge located in South Jordan—120 acres of restored upland and wetland acting as an important stopover for migratory songbirds and a haven for wetland species.

As we are nearing the conclusion of our funding from US Fish and Wildlife, we are now looking forward and determining a plan for this site. Specifically, we are creating the Refuge's Long Term Management Plan. One important facet of this plan includes detailing the target bird species which the site already serves and the species we hope to attract via our restoration efforts.
